David Hedgley

Prior to David Hedgley's algorithm, computers could only draw simple, one-dimensional things. "Hedgley's Algorithm," as it is known, solved this decades-old problem. Now computers can quickly draw an unrestricted number of three-dimensional creations, viewable from various perspectives, despite an object's complexity. Hedgley's innovation made possible superior 3D graphics for the video games, movies, cell phones, digital photography, and computer displays we all enjoy today.

Before growing more interested in mathematics, Hedgley was a school teacher for a time. He earned his master's degree in mathematics in 1961 and went to work for NASA where he wrote several technical papers.

To gain credibility, he presented his work at the Lawrence Livermore Laboratory near San Francisco, CA. Initially, his formula was met with skepticism by other scientists and mathematicians until he submitted his theory in writing. Once persuaded, he won accolades from both the public and private sectors. What followed was a huge step forward in computer graphics. In 1999, Hedgley created a second algorithm improving printed circuit technology. It was so complex, new symbols were created to explain it.

Fellows play a pivotal role in the DBHR team, helping solve real world problems in prevention science, substance use prevention, and mental health promotion. The DBHR Prevention Fellowship is a paid 10-month experience that offers unparalleled access to Washington State's leaders in behavioral health prevention, treatment, and recovery. Fellows dive into hands-on problem-based learning alongside the state's behavioral health prevention, treatment, and recovery leaders. At the end of the experience, fellows are uniquely positioned to enter the prevention workforce, walking away with newfound leadership and communication skills and a deep understanding of multi-level prevention work.
